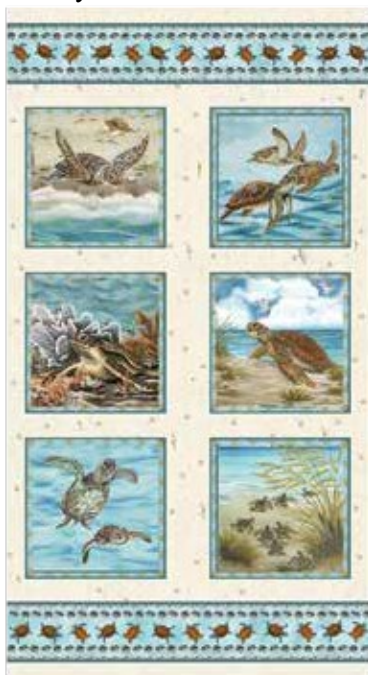

¾ yard (0.69m)	Tossed Ferns - Cream (C)	1140-31
1 ⅔ yards (1.53m)	Large Turtles - Sky Blue (D)	1143-11
⅔ yard (0.61m)	Starfish - Sand (E)	1142-31
⅜ yard (0.35m)	Seagulls Flying - Sky Blue (F)	1139-11
⅜ yard (0.35m)	Small Turtles - Sky Blue (G)	1141-11
⅞ yard (0.81m)	Folio Basics - Chamois (H)	7755-31*
1 ⅝ yards (1.49m)	Cloud Texture - Sky Blue (I)	1145-11
4 ⅓ yards (3.97m)	Bale of Turtles - Sand (Backing)	1144-31

### Cutting Instructions

Please note: All strips are cut across the width of fabric (WOF) from selvage to selvage edge unless otherwise noted.

#### From the 24 Inch Panel - Sky Blue (A):

- Fussy cut (1) 40 ½" x 22 ½" rectangle, centered on the panel.

#### From the Folio Basics - Aqua (B), cut:

- (2) 3" x 22 ½" WOF strips.
- (3) 3" x WOF strips. Sew the strips together end to end with diagonal seams and cut (2) 3" x 45 ½" strips.

#### From the Tossed Ferns - Cream (C), cut:

- (3) 3 ½" x WOF strips. Sub-cut (32) 3 ½" squares.
- (2) 2 ½" x 26 ½" WOF strips.
- (3) 2 ½" x WOF strips. Sew the strips together end to end with diagonal seams and cut (2) 2 ½" x 48 ½" strips.

#### From the Large Turtles - Sky Blue (D), cut:

- (2) 6 ½" x 57 ½" Length of Fabric (LOF) strips
- From the remaining fabric, cut (2) 6 ½" x 63 ½" WOF strips, piece as needed and (8) 6 ½" squares.

#### From the Starfish - Sand (E), cut:

- (4) 4 ¼" x WOF strips. Sub-cut (32) 4 ¼" squares. Cut the squares across both diagonals to make (128) 4 ¼" triangles.
- (2) 2" x WOF strips. Sub-cut (32) 2" squares.

#### From the Seagulls Flying - Sky Blue (F), cut:

- (2) 4 ¼" x WOF strips. Sub-cut (16) 4 ¼" squares. Cut the squares across both diagonals to make (64) 4 ¼" triangles.

#### From the Small Turtles - Sky Blue (G), cut:

- (3) 3 ½" x WOF strips. Sub-cut (32) 3 ½" squares.

#### From the Folio Basics - Chamois (H), cut:

- (2) 4 ¼" x WOF strips. Sub-cut (16) 4 ¼" squares. Cut the squares across both diagonals to make (64) 4 ¼" triangles.
- (7) 2 ½" x WOF strips for the binding.

#### From the Cloud Texture - Sky Blue (I), cut:

- (2) 2" x 54 ½" LOF strips.
- From the remaining fabric, cut (2) 2" x 51 ½" WOF strips, piece as needed.

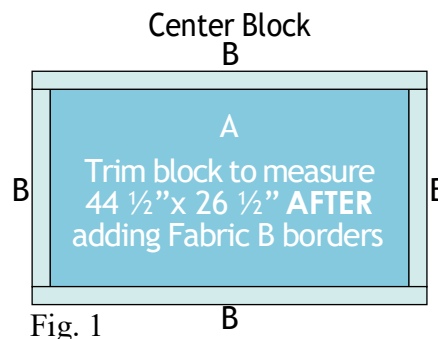
#### From Bale of Turtles - Sand (Backing), cut:

- (2) 77" x WOF strips for the backing. Sew the strips together and trim to make the 71" x 77" back.

### Block Assembly

Note: The arrows in figures represent the fabric print direction. Pay attention to the fabric and unit orientations when assembling the various components. Use a ¼" seam allowance with right sides together (RST) unless otherwise noted.

1. Sew (1) 3" x 22 ½" Fabric B strip to each side of the 40 ½" x 22 ½" Fabric B rectangle. Sew (1) 3" x 45 ½" Fabric B strip to the top and to the bottom of the Fabric A rectangle to make the Center Block (Fig. 1). **Trim the block to measure 44 ½" x 26 ½"**.



2. Place (1) 3 ½" Fabric C square on the top left corner of (1) 6 ½" Fabric D square, right sides together (Fig. 2). Sew across the diagonal of the smaller square from the upper right corner to the lower left corner (Fig. 2). Flip open the triangle formed and press. Trim away the excess fabric from behind the triangle ¼" away from the sewn seam (Fig. 3).

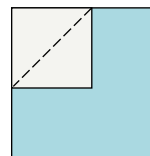

3. Follow Figure 4 for the seam direction to add a 3 1/2" Fabric C square to each of the remaining corners of the 6 1/2" Fabric D square to make (1) Unit 1 square (Fig. 5).

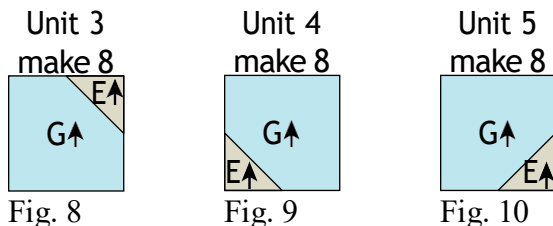
4. Repeat Steps 2-3 to make (8) Unit 1 squares total.



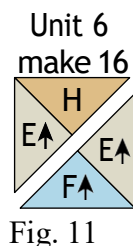
5. Place (1) 2" Fabric E square on the top left corner of (1) 3 1/2" Fabric G square, right sides together (Fig. 6). Sew across the diagonal of the smaller square from the upper right corner to the lower left corner (Fig. 6). Flip open the triangle formed and press. Trim away the excess fabric from behind the triangle 1/4" away from the sewn seam to make (1) Unit 2 square (Fig. 7). Repeat to make (8) Unit 2 squares total.



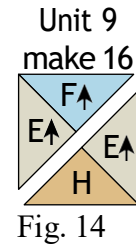
6. Repeat Step 5 and refer to Figures 8-10 for fabric identification, placement, seam direction and orientation to make (8) of each unit square for Unit 3 through Unit 5.



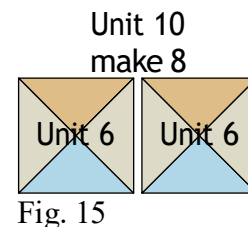
7. Sew (1) 4 1/4" Fabric E triangle and (1) 4 1/4" Fabric H triangle together along short sides. Sew (1) 4 1/4" Fabric E triangle and (1) 4 1/4" Fabric F triangle together along short sides. Sew together the (2) newly sewn triangles along the long sides to make (1) 3 1/2" Unit 6 square (Fig. 11). Repeat to make (16) Unit 6 squares total.



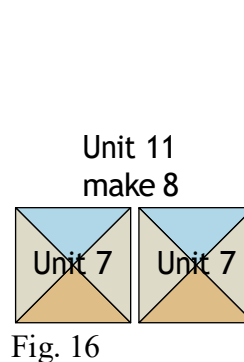
8. Repeat Step 7 and refer to Figures 12-14 for fabric identification, placement and orientation to make (16) of each unit square for Unit 7 through Unit 9.



9. Sew together (2) Unit 6 squares along the Fabric E sides to make (1) 3 1/2" x 6 1/2" Unit 10 rectangle (Fig. 15). Repeat to make (8) Unit 10 rectangles total.



10. Repeat Step 9 and refer to Figures 16-18 for component identification, placement and orientation to make (8) of each unit rectangle for Unit 11 through Unit 13.



11. Sew together (1) Unit 2 square, (1) Unit 10 rectangle and (1) Unit 3 square, in that order from left to right, to make the top row (Fig. 19).

12. Sew together (1) Unit 12 rectangle, (1) Unit 1 square and (1) Unit 13 rectangle, lengthwise and in that order from left to right, to make the middle row (Fig. 19).

13. Sew together (1) Unit 4 square, (1) Unit 11 rectangle and (1) Unit 5 square, in that order from left to right, to make the bottom row (Fig. 19).

14. Sew together the (3) rows from Steps 11-13 lengthwise to make (1) 12 ½” Block One square (Fig. 19).

15. Repeat Steps 11-14 to make (8) Block One squares total.

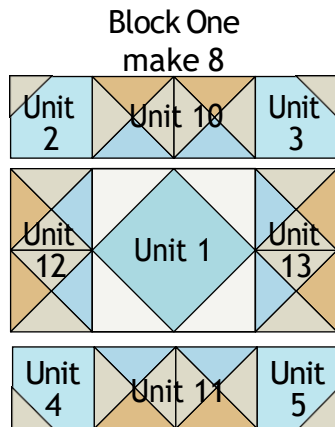

16. Sew (4) Block One squares together to make the Top Border (Fig. 20). Repeat to make the Bottom Border.

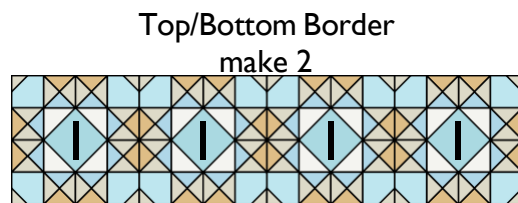

### Quilt Top Assembly

*(Follow the Quilt Layout while assembling the quilt top.)*

17. Sew (1) 2 ½” x 26 ½” Fabric C strip to each side of the Center Block. Sew (1) 2 ½” x 48 ½” Fabric C strip to the top and to the bottom of the Center Block.

18. Sew the Top Border and the Bottom Border to the top and to the bottom of the Center Block.

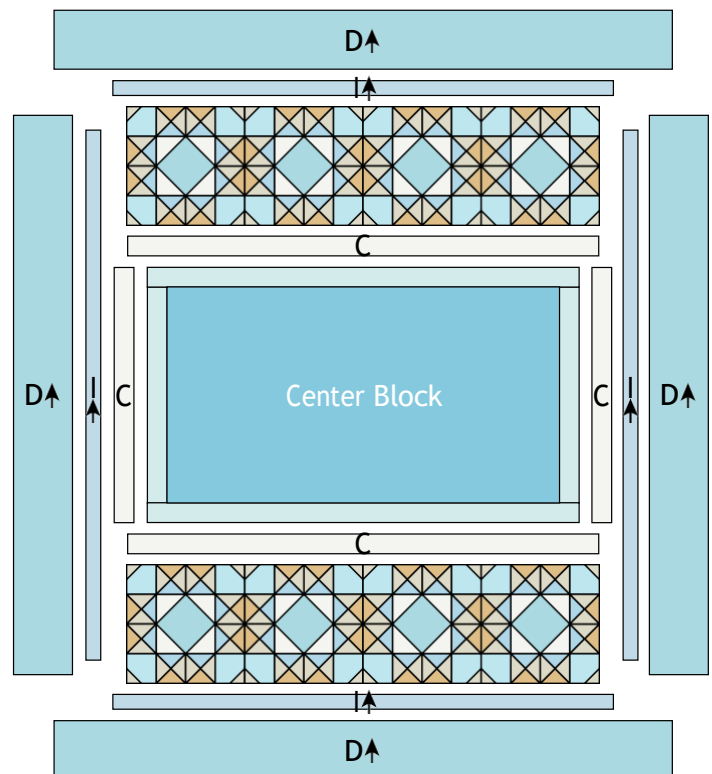
19. Sew (1) 2” x 54 ½” Fabric I strip to each side of the Center Block. Sew (1) 2” x 51 ½” Fabric I strip to the top and to the bottom of the Center Block.

20. Sew (1) 6 ½” x 57 ½” Fabric D strip to each side of the Center Block. Sew (1) 6 ½” x 63 ½” Fabric D strip to the top and to the bottom of the Center Block to make the quilt top.

21. Layer and quilt as desired.

22. Sew the (7) 2 ½” x WOF Fabric H strips together, end to end with 45-degree seams, to make the binding. Fold this long strip in half lengthwise with wrong sides together and press.

23. Bind as desired.
